Peter is president of the Irpinia Club of Toronto, which celebrates the rich diversity of Italian culture in Canada. Peter's efforts have resulted in more than \$1.7M invested into geriatric medicine at Sunnybrook since 2012.

Annual Retreat: Providing Feedback to Learners (Dec 7)

The annual division retreat was hosted at the Hyatt Regency in December and the theme for this year's event focussed on the intricacies of feedback within the context of Competence By Design (CBD) medical education. The event was well attended and brought together faculty and trainees to share updates regarding key initiatives and participate in an interactive workshop.

Keynote presenters and workshop leads, Dr. Susan Glover Takahashi and Dr. Rebecca Dubé (click to download bios), highlighted how developing a positive culture of feedback is an integral component of both CBD and faculty development. In exploring the role of data, and how both providing and receiving feedback can be




challenging, Rebecca offered some practical, evidence-based tips for feedback mechanics:

- 1. Ask if feedback is wanted (yes/no, now/later)
- 2. Consider performance & educational goals
- 3. allot sufficient time
- 4. Choose a private setting
- 5. Label activity as "feedback"
- 6. Engage in reflection/analysis
- 7. Use clear, plain language
- 8. Factually describe performance "data is not feedback"
- 9. Focus your messages
- 10. Coach for improvement

The International Conference on Residency Education (ICRE) was hosted in Niagara Falls and provided an opportunity for clinical educators and physicians to explore topics related to this year's theme, "Advancing quality: aligning residency education and patient care". A unique offering of this event is the resident focussed International Resident Leadership Summit (IRLS) stream that runs in parallel.

Dr. Jillian Alston and **Dr. Yaser Habeeb** attended proceedings with support from both the DoM and the Division. Below, are some highlights and pearls of wisdom from the sessions that they attended:

- Evidence demonstrates linkage between leadership and health services outcomes, including quality of care, patient satisfaction and mortality, organizational financial performance as well as staff well-being and engagement
- Not just a trend, QI is a framework to improve health care delivery and a component of good leadership
- Use <u>SMART</u> objectives to drive successful change (<u>Specific</u>, <u>Measurable</u>, <u>Attainable</u>, <u>Relevant</u>, <u>Time-bound</u>)
- A good leader requires good time management click to download physician tips



The resource stewardship session was a highlight for Jillian. Presenters Drs. A Verma (UofT) and C. Hillis (McMaster) noted that physicians play an important role in this area and can focus on appropriate allocation of resources to optimize patient outcomes whilst achieving value for health care dollars. 
